OPENING STATEMENT ECUADOR

Honorable Chair, fellow delegates, distinguished guests,

I would like to thank Secretary General Luis Almagro, Dr. Joan Andorfer President of the IDDA, Professor Doug Freidman, and the faculty advisors for allowing us the opportunity to present our research and solutions to the rest of the present delegations.

And we cannot afford to continue making speeches.

OPENING STATEMENT DELEGATION OF THE REPUBLIC OF COSTA RICA

OPENING STATEMENT DELEGATION OF TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO

Greetings Honorable Chairs and Fellow Delegations. That is, on the matter of the COVID-19 pandemic, that has, and continues to greatly impact all Member States. Many lessons have been learned in the present era, including the need for Member States to "extend among themselves the benefits of science and technology."

The Delegation of Trinidad and Tobago comes in peace and embraces continued unity among all Member States, as together the focal point remains to charter a brighter future for all.

OPENING STATEMENT

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

The Dominican Republic, as one of the founding members of the Organization of American States (OAS), is pleased to support the mission of the OAS and its four pillars: Democracy, Integral Development, Hemispheric Security, and Human Rights. The Delegation from Brazil upholds the right to independent speech and press freedom while simultaneously emphasizing the need to prevent hate speech. Brazil supports the self-expression of all of its citizens when it comes to gender identity, while also acknowledging the necessity of decisions being made at a mature age of consent.

Finally, Brazil encourages Member States to take this opportunity to invest in regional integration. Partnering with governments and businesspeople throughout the hemisphere, Brazil aims to advance regional energy security through initiatives such as hydroelectric joint ventures and energy grid integration. Meanwhile, Brazil also seeks the integration of hemispheric disease prevention efforts, health education campaigns, and vaccine development initiatives in partnership with the private sector. Let us move forward together.

OPENING STATEMENT DELEGATION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
